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

The Pangnirtung Screamer (& Margaret's Flying Knitting Needles and John's Green Hat!)

On April 1st 1999, after 15 years of negotiations a new Province was founded in Canada. It is called Nunavut with Iqaluit as its capital, and one of its small towns named Pangnirtung.

In May 1999, Margaret and I flew to Iqaluit arriving to hear the bells of the igloo shaped Cathedral ringing to mark Ascension Day. We had been invited to attend the 10 day Diocesan Synod which was due to begin on the 26th. On the 19th we were due to fly to Pangnirtung but the arranging of that flight had presented difficulties for Margaret.



Why?

Well in the weeks leading up to April 1st the UK's Sunday newspapers had printed many articles about the historic event of a new Province. Some of the journalists found the 50 minute of flight (in a 6 seater plane) to Pangnirtung to be frightening and had nicknamed the plane 'The Pangnirtung Screamer'.

In Pangnirtung was the small college for the training of clergy and I had been invited to discuss with the students the 13 Apostles of St Paul which are found in our New Testament.

Margaret was very uncertain about taking that flight but after feeling that God was saying "in all your journeys I will be with you" she agreed to accompany me.

We six passengers sat one behind the other down one side. I, as the front one, was within touching distance of the pilot. We flew over land and frozen sea inlets and finally what seemed almost like a cutting between fairly high hills to land on Pangnirtung's single runway which ended as a cliff dropped into the sea!

During the flight, Margaret knitted like mad. The end result? The best week of all the five weeks we had in Nunavut – which has nothing to do with Margaret's knitting but has something to do with John's green hat.

Recipes

Why not give these simple seasonal recipes a go!

Quick & Easy Fish Pie

Ingredients

- 2 medium potatoes, peeled and cut into 2.5cm chunks
- 1 tbsp butter
- 200g can sweetcorn, drained
- 200g mixed fish fillets or fish pie mix
- 200ml tub full fat crème fraiche
- ½ tbsp cornflour
- 25g cheddar cheese, grated
- Handful of cherry tomatoes, halved
- Freshly ground salt and black pepper



Method

Preheat the oven to 200°C, (180°C fan).

Put the potatoes in a pan, cover with boiling water, bring back to the boil and cook for 8-10 minutes until tender.

Drain the potatoes through a colander then return to the pan. Add the butter and roughly mash with a potato masher.

Put the sweetcorn in the base of an ovenproof dish and top with the fish pieces.

Mix the crème fraiche and cornflour together, season lightly with salt and pepper and pour over the fish and sweetcorn.

Top with the mashed potato, then sprinkle with the grated cheese and black pepper.

Arrange the tomatoes on top and bake in the oven for 25-30 minutes until the top is golden and the sauce is bubbling.

Baked Peaches (serves 6)

Ingredients

- 3 medium peaches
- 2 tbsp. packed brown sugar
- 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
- Pinch nutmeg (optional)
- 3 tbsp. butter
- Vanilla ice cream, for serving

Method

Preheat oven to 325°. Halve peaches and remove pits, then place cut side up in a medium baking dish.

In a small bowl, whisk to combine sugar, cinnamon, and nutmeg, if using. Sprinkle mixture over cut side of each peach. Cut butter into 3 evenly sized tablespoons, then halve each piece. Place a pat of butter in centre of each peach.

Bake until peaches are tender but not losing shape, about 40 minutes. Serve with vanilla ice cream.

Meet your Governors

Introducing: Pam Posnett

I was born and raised in Derbyshire, the eldest child of 4 and the only girl. My father was the village Blacksmith and Farrier.

I left School and trained as a nurse in Nottingham, upon Qualifying I moved to Kent and worked for Bowater Scott as an Industrial Nurse (now known as Occupation Health Nurse), very different from the NHS but also enjoyable and in some ways more challenging. You were the person who had to make the diagnosis when there was no Doctor on the ward to refer to!



I moved back to Derbyshire got married had two children. Jane who works for a Housing Developer and Patrick, a Padre in the Army. I continued working as a nurse, part time for a nursing Agency.

This job ultimately led to me working in Melton Mowbray at Pedigree Pet Foods (Part of Mars UK). I was asked to apply for a job at the company and was successful. Unfortunately at this time my marriage came to an end.

I thought I might only stay 5 years in Melton but a few years later I remarried a local person and the rest is history! I worked for the company for 20 years, I took a redundancy offer then my husband and I started our own Occupational Health business which we ran for 12 years.

This was another good time, I met lots of different people working in different occupations and travelled the country from Wick in Scotland to Newton Abbot in Devon.

In 2003 I indulged my interest in Politics and got elected as a Councillor for Melton Borough Council, a position I hold still today. It was due to my position as a County Councillor that I was asked if I would like to become the County representative as a Trustee of Wyggeston Hospital Trust.

To be truthful I had never heard of it and when I was told it was off Hinckley Road. I searched my memory as on my infrequent trips along Hinckley Road I had never seen a hospital. I became very interested in the scheme when finding out about the history.



So the day arrived I was invited to attend my first meeting, so left home with the satnav set and when I dubiously turned right as my satnav instructed me to do, I actually had to stop the car and just gaze as I could not believe something like Wyggeston was so close to the City Centre. It was like entering a village.

I am enjoying my time at Wyggeston and never tire of explaining to people what it is and a little of its history.

I have held various positions in both Councils, I was Mayor of Melton in 2007 and am now Vice Chairman of Planning at County. I am a member of the Cabinet and have Communities as my portfolio and was Chairman of the County Council in 2019 and 2020.

Outside of this I chair Melton Mencap, Chair Directors at Melton Learning Hub (an alternative curriculum for students who are not Academic) and am a trustee at Melton Young Singles Trust (a Hostel for young Homeless)

I have 4 Grandchildren, 2 girls 2 boys who are all now in their twenties but they still I am pleased to say like to visit Mamma. I also enjoy travelling, theatre and cooking.
