
From February the admin offices will have moved!

When is a coincidence not a coincidence?

This is a big question because we can deny Gods love in our lives when we are too quick to say "It's just a coincidence!" I have had some amazing coincidences in my life; too amazing for them to actually be coincidences.

Here is one of them, I was in my thirties working as a social worker at the Maternity Hospital on the Neo Natal Unit. My work included trying to help newly grieving parents with the loss of their babies, when sadly they didn't make it. One such couple was Ethan and Carla (not their real names): A lovely little family. They already had one child and then they had just had two beautiful twin girls. It was unusual to see full size babies in the incubators but they had suffered brain damage.

One of the baby girls died and I spent time sitting with Carla. There isn't much to do at this point except to be there. The following day the second twin died, what a tragedy. I could hardly hold my tears back, but I braced myself and went to see Carla again, there were no words, just sitting, holding hands and hoping that Carla would understand there was nothing I could say that would help. (Later she told me how much it did help, just to have someone there to share just a little of her grief). I did continue seeing Ethan and Carla at their home for a time and then for the last time on the 1st anniversary of the babies deaths. "So what?" you may be asking, "What is coincidental in that?" Well, fast forward 2-3 years. My eldest daughter Steph, who lived in Bolton at the time with hubby Steve, was expecting Josh (who gets married this April) and decided there was enough time to drive to Leicester for the weekend. How wrong can you be? She went into labour which meant she needed to give birth in Leicester, I was very happy that they both wanted me at the birth. After the birth Steph needed

some more attention and I slipped out of the delivery room to find a coffee machine.

Wow, what a surprise. Who should be in the coffee area other than Ethan, Carla had just given birth to another little boy, I was invited to go to see Carla and the



baby (I was shown a shortlist of names and asked to choose one of them.) It was such a privilege and blessing to see Carla, Ethan and the baby. What a wonderful ending to this little saga.

So it was a coincidence that I was there at just the right time or was it God? Well, it was all about timing. In order for me to be there at that moment, my daughter and son in law needed to make the decision to travel to Leicester. They then needed to agree that I could be at the birth, Steph's Labour needed to coincide with Carla's labour, for them to give birth at about the same time, and then Ethan and I both had to have the same thought "Coffee!" and to be at the coffee machine at the same time.

Surly this is more than a coincidence. In my book "it's a miracle!" It showed me that when I am in a really difficult heart-breaking situation, where deep-down I was overwhelmed with Carla's grief, God was with me and saw it. He was holding my hand and also Carla's. It mattered to God enough to orchestrate all the events, to



bring Carla and I together to celebrate the birth of her next child and God wants you to know that he is there for you (when you face overwhelming situations) holding your hand in difficult times and the amazing thing is that he wants you to know that he is behind the scenes, working the miracles so don't be in a

hurry to say "it's just a coincidence" when you get a wonderful outcome, look for "the miraculous".

The four of us were lucky kids, my three sisters and me. Lucky because we had a really big garden with trees to climb and ample room for play and for growing things. We had an old wicker three-wheeler bath chair which when steered by the occupant and pushed from behind could speed round the garden path with more spills than at any Grand Prix. In one corner was

a tumbledown shed to explore, full of old furniture, and known as Buckingham Palace. Dad owned a meeting hall next door: good for roller skating in wet weather.

But it wasn't all play. We did our bit for the war effort by digging for victory. One lawn was now replaced with rows of cucumbers, carrots and curly kale.

We had a menagerie of pets: Tiddles the tabby; a black Labrador whose name is now offensive; a rabbit or two, some hens, a full-throated cockerel and his sleeping partner known affectionately as Mrs Drake. A widow, I think, as there was no Mr Drake.

But there was a down-side to this children's paradise: scary, and potentially deadly. It was the early 1940's and we were in south-suburban London.

On many nights anti-aircraft guns were noisy and persistent: evidence of enemy aircraft in the vicinity. Shrapnel



made an eerie whistling noise as it fell back to earth. Seriously frightening was the low drone of the *Luftwaffe:* soft at first, then louder, and then... hopefully dying away again. But most terrifying of all was the whistle and screech of falling bombs. All you could do was to hold your breath, wait – and *pray*.

Some nights fires lit up the sky. Our full-throated cockerel would crow

fortissimo, thinking it was the dawn. Mrs Drake quacked loudly with annoyance while we were snug in our Hobbitlike Anderson shelter.

One Sunday afternoon Mum went to church just around the corner. Soon the air-raid warning scuttled the rest of us into the shelter. This was no false alarm. A heavy throbbing warned of approaching enemy aircraft. Within moments there was a series of terrifying, screeching whistles and ear-shattering explosions. A stick of high-explosive bombs had straddled our garden.

It felt as if we were all being carried high into the air – a sort of weightlessness. The noise of falling debris and garden soil continued for some minutes. When things quietened down we peeped outside not quite knowing what to expect.

After some minutes and as the dust and debris began to settle we could see a large round crater half in our garden and half next door. Our garden fence had received a direct hit. Sir John Anderson, Churchill's Home Secretary, had saved *our* lives, but what about Mum? Had one of the other bombs fallen on the church? After the *All Clear* she hurried home and with hugs all round we were happily reunited.



The deep round crater wasn't filled in for many months and provided

us with plenty of gooey modelling clay. Later that winter, to the utmost and continuing delight of Mrs Drake, it filled with water. She was now, as never before, truly and happily, in her element.

Why not give these simple recipes a try?

Tomato Pasta Bake

Ingredients

- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 1 onion, chopped
- 1 garlic clove, crushed
- 400g canned cherry tomatoes or chopped tomatoes
- Pinch of sugar
- A few dashes Worcestershire sauce
- 100g pasta
- 50g cheddar cheese, grated



Method

Heat the oil in a medium pan and fry the onion for 5 mins until softened and lightly golden. Stir in the garlic and cook for a further min. Mix in the tomatoes and sugar, bring to the boil and simmer for 20 mins. Add a few dashes of Worcestershire sauce and season to taste. This basic sauce can now be chilled or frozen. Meanwhile, cook the pasta according to pack instructions. Heat the grill to high. Drain the pasta and stir into the sauce and place in an oven proof dish. Scatter over the cheese and grill for 3-5 mins or until bubbling hot and golden. Serve with a simple salad.

Almond, Apple and Pear Sponge

Ingredients

- 2 Bramley apples
- 500g pears
- Juice of 1/2 lemon
- 85g caster sugar
- 1 tbsp rosewater

Topping

- 115g softened butter
- 115g caster sugar
- 100g self-rising flour
- 75g ground almonds
- 3 medium eggs
- ¹/₂ tsp almond extract

Method

Preheat oven to gas 4/180 degrees, core and chop the apples and pears and place in a bowl with the lemon juice, add sugar and rosewater and mix thoroughly then pour into a 1.5L pie dish. In a large bowl, beat the butter and sugar until pale and fluffy. In another bowl mix together flour and almonds, then beat the eggs butter and flour mixture, add the almond extract and spread over the fruit, bake for 50 minutes or until golden, sprinkle with extra sugar and serve at room temperature.

Meet your Governors


We have asked some of Governors to introduce and tell us a bit about themselves.....

Introducing: Duncan Lucas

Born in Wigston Magna in 1929, history was always pumped into me. Wyggestons Hospital was always a name for me to conjure. The Hill Family were tenants of the ancient farm 3 doors away from me. The farm spanned the A50 near where the Police HQ in Enderby stands with the fire station next door.



Along came the sale of the land to the builders. BANG goes the ancient cottages converted in to



wagon hovels and cow sheds, which then became a new road. The whole of the land was then sold off. This was a narrow strip of 100 acres almost stretching to Kilby Church.

I remonstrated with the neighbour who lived 2 doors away that this land had potential but he felt stocks and shares were the future not rental land. Now this land is falling to the housing, boom. Who was right?

The clock moves on and I was elected onto the County Council. The first meeting elected members to serve on

various sub-committees and Wyggestons Hospital was one. So I applied and got a seat in 1985. I served on the Estates Committee and found myself serving under the Chairmanship of Alderman Heard, never dreaming I should get that rare title.

With an officer who used his committee fully for support, I enjoyed the job and when the 500th anniversary came along I volunteered to form a special committee, was elected chairman and set out a programme of events.

Never shy in coming forward, the committee certainly homed plants and maintained 5 acre wood near Kilby, which is known as 'Wyggestons Wood'.

My family is a son, daughter, 3 grandchildren, 8 great grandchildren.



Whilst serving I was member of Estates Committee and also Vice-Chairman. I am the second longest serving Governor in office in my present body!


